You can go to a place like Smitty's Auto Parts and get a used part from a wrecked car, fix yours and save money.

"Insurance usually pays them for the new part and people can come and buy it at a reasonable price and save money," said Hajizadeh.

"They can pocket the cash?" asked Reporter Sabrina Hall.

"They can," said Hajizadeh.

"Could you go to Puerto Rico with that money?" asked Hall.

"Sure. You can go wherever you want to if you don't want to repair your car," said Raybin.

Raybin says if you get a reasonable estimate on the cost to fix your car, your insurance company, in most cases, must write you a check and you can choose to be thrifty or even keep the cash.

The attorney says the one thing you can't do is make a fraudulent claim.
